Swimming Pool Operating Guidelines







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1. Introduction

This sample pool guidelines has been produced to provide clubs with guidance in documenting the changes required for the return by clubs to swimming pools. Parts of this document can be used with little or no change whereas other parts will be very specific to your own pool. When producing your own club guidelines you must work with your pool management and ensure that there both comply with the revised pool arrangements and are agreed with the pool management.

This document is based on one which has been reviewed by the local council H&S department and leisure centres manger.

This will not be set in stone and you will need to review of a regular basis to reflect things as they change.

Finally when your document has been agreed you will need to share this with all of your club members.

The <u>name of Club has been meeting at the <u>name</u> Swimming Pool for <u>whatever</u> years. Until the outbreak of the Coronavirus pandemic the club operated under the provisions of <u>Swimming Pool's</u> Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) and the Emergency Operating Procedures (EOPs) together with guidance from the Sub Aqua Association, the clubs governing body and UK federation of CMAS (World Underwater Federation).</u>

This new set of guidelines has been produced to both document how the club operators within the pool environment, as agreed with the <u>Swimming</u> Pool management, with details of the additional requirements as a result of the Coronavirus pandemic, and to provide club members with an additional guidance to keep them safe at this time.

2. COVID-19 Safety Requirements

The *Name of Club* derives its COVID-19 guidance from the BDSG (British Diver Safety Group) Web Site (https://bdsg.org.uk/) which is a repository for a wide ranging advice covering all aspects of UK diving and divers.

The BDSG consists of representatives from all dive and national agencies including the RNLI, HSE, MCA and UKDMC to name just a few.

2.1. Revised Club Times

To meet covid-19 requirements the club has agreed to move our times to 20:30hrs to 21:30hrs during the period of the pandemic. This is to allow the pool staff 30 minutes between sessions to undertake full cleaning of the pool area.

During the special arrangements club members will not be allowed into the pool building without prior agreement with the pool management.

2.2. Prior to Pool Night

Before arriving at the pool members will confirm their plans for the evening, with the Pool Marshal, these must reflect:

- If, as an individual, you wish to use the pool to swim. There will be a requirement to mark off two lanes for a maximum of seven swimmers.
- If no-one books a swimming slot the area will not be marked off so that the whole pool area is open to divers.
- Anyone snorkelling will be regarded as swimmers at this time.
- Instructors will liaise with their trainees to discuss which skills they will be practising during the next pool session.
- The maximum number of divers in the whole pool is fifteen, this is reduced to ten when the swimming area is in place.
- If anyone wants to remain on the poolside during the session must also book a place as the pool has limited the number of spectators at any time to *four*.

If the pool occupancy level exceeds that numbers allowed the Pool Marshal will allocate slots so that all members who want to use the pool will have at least some time each Friday.

2.3. Entry to the building

When planning to use the pool club members should:

- You must not attend the pool if you or any member of your household are showing signs of COVID-19 symptoms, these include any one of the following:
 - o **a high temperature** this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
 - a new, continuous cough this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
 - a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

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- At all times maintain the required social distance which is in force at the time, including wearing any recommended PPE (e.g. face coverings)
- Before travelling to the pool you should shower at home, this will help with the pool
 water quality and the water treatment process.
- Travel to the pool wearing their pool kit.
- If diving in the pool any required pre-brief should be conducted in the car park.
- Kit should be assembled in the car park and carried into the pool ready assembled.
- The Pool Marshal will allocate an order in which each Buddy Team can enter the building, the route into and out of the pool area are shown in Section 6 Pool Configuration – COVID-19 Restrictions with Swimmers
- Once in the designated area members should remove their outer clothing which should be placed in a bag.

2.4. Pool and Surrounding Area

When in the pool area remember the social distancing rules, particularly:

- Swimmers to maintaining social distance in line with Swimming pool guidelines.
- Divers:
 - While on the surface and poolside should maintain social distance in-line with those in force for swimmers
 - While underwater there is no need to social distance as the virus cannot be transmitted underwater.

2.5. Exit from the building

When leaving the pool club members should:

- Members bags with their outer clothing will be moved from the entry point to the pool exit end by the Pool Marshal.
- Exit from the pool, as indicated in Section 6 Pool Configuration COVID-19 Restrictions with Swimmers.
- Under current guidelines swimmers etc. are advised to simply don their cloths and shower when they get home. In view of this divers may wish to wear swimming wear under their normal diving clothes which is easier to dry off while wearing and will carry less water into the car.
- Kit should be dismantled in the car park.

2.6. Use of Equipment

When using snorkeler or SCUBA equipment members should take the following into account:

- Use of a snorkel
 - The use of forceful clearing of the snorkel carries a high risk of virus transmission due to the potential for atomisation of the expired air being capable of being carried further than normal. Snorkelers will not use this method.
 - Snorkels fitted with a purge valve will reduce the problem as the water if dispelled into the pool water



- If using a snorkel without a purge valve use the displacement method to clear, that is blow the water out of the snorkel while underwater with the snorkel pointing down.
- The chlorinated water is known to kill the virus over a relatively short period of time. This will in effect disinfect a divers kit during a normal session underwater.
- When leaving the pool it is recommend that all divers swill their mask and regulator
 in the pool water, this will not disinfect completely as the immersion time will not be
 sufficient, but provides a limited level of protection until they are disinfected at home.

3. Name of Club - Risk Assessment

The Name of Club follows the guidance provided by the HSE in determining and managing risks to the club members, these include the following key steps:

- 1) Identify hazards
 - a. Review all the activities undertaken by the club and its members and visitors
- 2) Assess the risks
 - a. Who might be harmed and how
 - b. What we are already doing to control the risks
 - c. What further action we need to take to control the risks
 - d. Who needs to carry out any actions and by when
- 3) Control the risks
 - a. Can the risk be removed completely
 - b. If not can the risk be mitigated to be at an acceptable level
- 4) Record our findings
 - a. The hazards (things that may cause harm)
 - b. Who might be harmed and how
 - c. What you are doing to control the risks
- 5) Review the controls
 - a. Are the controls still effective
 - b. Has there been any changes






